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Eco-Flamenco: a dress made by THOUSANDS of people during ArtPrize

Artist Nancy Judd, recently accepted into the Smithsonian's permanent collection, is creating a new piece with thousands of ArtPrize attendees that will be completed by October 9th.

The base of the dress is made from parachute scraps. When completed, it will be covered in thousands of ruffles made from cereal boxes painted red with recycled paint. The paint was donated by E-Paint Recycling in Battle Creek, MI. The painted cereal boxes will be cut into circles and sewn onto the base dress to look like lavish ruffles.

Additionally, each ruffle contains an eco-pledge: something that participants have promised to do to care for the earth.

Thus far, the Grand Rapids community has helped to create this dress by bringing in 200 cereal boxes, spending over 60 hours volunteering to paint and cut the boxes into circles, and filled out over 500 pledges!

"I am overwhelmed by how helpful and kind people are in Grand Rapids! There also is a strong commitment to sustainability here that makes working on this project so easy—I feel like people really get what I am doing." says Judd.
