Santa Fe Artist and environmental educator Nancy Judd is installing her Recycle Runway Exhibit in the Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport, displaying her one-of-a-kind, award-winning couture recycled fashions from February 13, 2010 through August 8, 2010. Recycle Runway is a traveling exhibit of custom-designed recycled garments showcased around the country to promote sustainability. Commissioned by global organizations including Toyota®, Target®, Coca-Cola®, and the Glass Packaging Institute, the Recycle Runway garments were created to showcase the creativity of sustainability by combining the art of haute couture and environmental education. The next exhibit will be in the Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport in the fall of 2010.

Nancy Judd will give presentations on the environment and her collection of trashique fashions to youth groups in Phoenix while she is in town the week of February 8, 2010.

The mission of Recycle Runway is to change the way the world thinks about the environment through innovative educational programs and couture fashions made from trash. Elegant garments created from waste materials are exhibited in high-traffic airports to grab travelers' attention and inspire personal action. Community-based presentations and workshops launch children and adult's imaginations while providing information on how to conserve resources on a grassroots level. Recycle Runway partners with businesses, non-profits, governmental agencies, foundations and individuals who actively support environmental conservation.
