Each garment is a one-of-a-kind piece of wearable art that takes between 100 to 450 hours to create. Nancy Judd's goal is to design all of her garments to last at least 100 years, thus inspiring generations of people to reduce their environmental impact.

Paper Lace Shoes Cost to make: \$2,000, 20 hours to create

Vintage shoes covered with recycled office paper cut into an original lace design and glued to the shoes.



Aluminum Purse
Cost to make: \$1,500,
15 hours to create
Vintage purse covered
with aluminum cans
cut into "rain-drop"
shapes.

Obamanos Coat

Cost to make: \$45,000, 450 hours to create

Paper door hangers from the Obama campaign were cut into strips, and sewn onto canvas panels which were hand sewn onto a man's vintage coat. The **Smithsonian** has agreed to accept the Obamanos Coat into their permanent collection.

Cost to make: \$10,000, 100 hours to create

GARMENT COST

The cost of a new garment depends upon the design and the materials used to create it. All Recycle Runway garments are made from trash, a free material, however different materials take more time to gather, process and sew.

The cost to design and create a new garment is based on a \$100 an hour fee. Throughout this document there are examples of various Recycle Runway garments and accessories, also included is the time it took to create them and the cost to make the garments.

Nancy Judd can submit a formal proposal for your organization, once she has an idea of your budget, the general design, the materials that you want to use, and the intended use for the garment.



Rusty Nail Vest Cost to make: \$5,000, 50 hours to create

Rusty nails are sewn, and nail heads are glued onto a vintage vest.

Cost to make: \$20,000, 200 hours to create

Aluminum cans were hand-cut into circles and raindrops, punched with holes, and sewn onto a dress made from an old cloth shower curtain.

She also invites the children to make a new garment with her! **The Youth Eco-Dress** (which has not yet been sponsored) will be created from environmental pledges, made by the children, on strips of recycled paper turned into paper-link-chains and attached to a Scarlett O'Hara style dress. It will be completed in time for the Atlanta Airport Exhibit and seen by over 13 million people!
