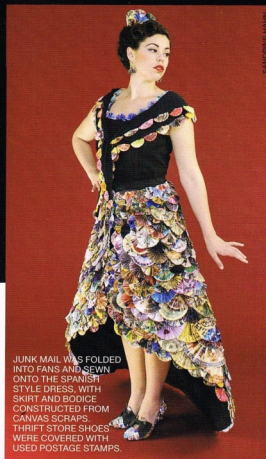

Eco-Trash Garment Exhibition on view
at Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta Airport

THIS FESTIVE COMBO COMMISSIONED BY TARGET TOOK 100 HOURS TO MAKE. THE SKIRT, ARMBANDS AND TOP WERE MADE FROM AN EMPLOYEE'S OLD SHIRT AND ACCENTED WITH PLASTIC TARGET BAGS. PAPER BEADS WERE CREATED FROM CARDBOARD PRODUCT DISPLAYS. THE GARMAN MIRANDA-STYLE HEADDRESS WAS MADE WITH PLASTIC BAGS, CARDBOARD DISPLAYS AND A RETURNED BASEBALL GAME.

In celebration of Earth Month, Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta Airport will present the popular national eco-fashion exhibition "Recycle Runway," by Santa Fe artist Nancy Judd, April 1 through April 2012. Eighteen of her eye-popping creations will be on view in display cases in International Concourse E.

TOP RIGHT: GREEN DRY CLEANER BAGS AND BLUE PLASTIC NEWSBAPER BAGS WERE IROMED TOGETHER TO CREATE THE AQUATIC SKIRT. THE BODICE, SKIRT, TENGATLES AND NECKLACE WERE MADE FROM WHITE GROCERY BAGS.

Faux fur jackets made with endless loops of cassette and video tape. A dress made of origami junk mail. Fans sewn together like fish scales. A dress made from dry cleaning bags.

An evening gown glittering with thousands of pieces of crushed glass. Each dazzling "eco-trash couture" fashion by Nancy Judd takes between 100-450 hours to create and is the culmination of ingenious re-use. Her elegant garments are exhibited in high-traffic airports, shopping malls and museums to grab visitor's attention and inspire personal action. The mission: to change the way people live on the earth through innovative exhibitions that showcase sustainable fashion designs made from trash.

Recycle Runway partners with businesses, non-profits, government agencies, foundations and individuals who actively support environmental conservation. In addition to the exhibition, Judd will present a series of workshops and presentations to Atlanta groups. Delta Air Lines will also be commissioning the artist to create a garment out of re-claimed materials from Delta Air Lines operations.

"Recycle Runway" is part of Atlanta's Airport Art Program, which integrates art, exhibits and performances into the airport environment for the benefit of passengers and employees.
